#### LETTER FROM OUR FOUNDER

As the new year 2020 dawned, we anticipated what it would hold for Wells of Life. We had planned to make it the year to celebrate the ten-year mark of drilling water wells. As we glanced back over a decade of growth as a Non-Government Organization (NGO), we saw 2020 as the year we would slow down, work on expanding our infrastructure and celebrate the miracle of water to over 630,000 people.

Then, everything changed for all of us. We suddenly found ourselves faced with the challenge of leading Wells of Life through a worldwide pandemic. Opening people's eyes to the suffering that goes on daily two continents away is difficult at the best of times. After COVID-19 landed on our shores, we were left searching for answers. We knew we would need to dig deep as the world leaders searched for direction.

One of the blessings of being an NGO built on sound business principles was that we could move swiftly to redirect our work in Uganda. We decided to go to the front lines and become a first responder organization. Our team in Uganda was led by Adrian Laurentiu, one of the bravest and most determined men I have ever met. With Adrian rallying our team, Wells of Life equipped itself within weeks to distribute large quantities of soap, face masks, and surgical gloves. The communities were protected from COVID-19 by something as simple as a bar of soap. We continued our drilling program throughout the crisis with the support of the local government. Where there was fear and concern, we brought health, safety, and clean water to those in

What I am most proud of is the determination and resilience of my staff, our board of directors, and our donors, the backbone of our organization. Initially, we saw our donations fall very substantially as families, businesses, and foundations grappled with the effects of the new and dangerous virus.

By mid-year, the declining pattern of contributions was apparent. While transitioning our US staff to work remotely, we also successfully moved our Run4Water Annual Family and Community Event, to a virtual event. We raised enough money to bring clean water to 42,000 people. And we continued to have faith that our donors would answer the call and allow us to meet our goals for 2020.

We then took the unprecedented step of holding a Gala at Pelican Hill Resort in late November. This event was simultaneously broadcast to 14 countries across the globe. On a night where none of us knew what to expect, we enjoyed our most successful event ever, raising over one million dollars. The support given to Wells of Life by our presenting sponsors, Lugano Diamonds and Farmers and Merchants Bank, filled the event with a belief in the goodness of God in honoring the efforts made to bring water in His name.

This momentum rolled into December. And it seemed that with every new day that passed, your commitment to our work continued to grow. Words cannot express the gratitude I felt as we closed out 2020, exceeding our goal for the year. We raised over \$1.63 million dollars bringing water to 147,000 people. Thanks to your generosity, Wells of Life took its rightful place in Orange County's most successful nonprofits of 2020. The new decade ushers in a new chapter where we will continue to build on the knowledge gained from 10 years of working in rural Uganda.

I am humbled and honored to lead this organization with your support in creating a world where water is available to all of God's children. Thank you for standing with us.



# 2020 Covid Response

IN CRISIS, WE GROW STRONGER

### How a Bar of Soap Brought Life & Hope

Like all other charity organizations across the world, Wells of Life experienced lockdowns and curfews in Uganda that threatened to limit our impact for tens of thousands of people. However, at the direction of our CEO Nick Jordan, Wells of Life was one of the first to respond to the health and safety needs of rural Uganda in the midst of the pandemic.

Within a matter of weeks after the first lockdown, we rose to the occasion by providing hand soap for families and health care centers, handwashing stations for schools, and protective face shields for health care workers.

At the direction of the national government, Wells of Life became designated First Responders by providing essential services and equipment to rural communities.

Not only was our water-related work of saving and improving lives undeterred, but we also quickly and unexpectedly became recognized as an NGO the country could count on to provide much-needed health and COVID safe interventions. There was a time for protocol and there was a time for action. In this emergency, Wells of Life opted for the latter... bringing "life and hope".




WHAT WE DO

### Wells of Life Programs

Wells of Life is a Christian nonprofit organization that provides safe access to clean, sustainable drinking water in the communities of rural Uganda. Our desire is to improve quality of life, one well at a time. We offer 3 main programs for you to support: **New Wells, Operation Restoration,** and **The Healthy Village Program**. We also provide additional programs through partnerships with other NGOs.

#### **Additional Programs**

She for She: We have discovered the power of partnership in serving the needs of the people of Uganda. Wells of Life is partnered with *She for She*, a Uganda-based social organization, that provides sustainable menstrual kits and education to girls in rural areas. This program is essential for empowering girls to confidently continue their education, without interruption. This program is available for funding.

Hand-Washing Stations: Wells of Life made it a priority to install handwashing stations with a reliable supply of clean water and plenty of soap to help prevent the spread of COVID-19. Your ongoing support of this program makes it possible for schools to reopen.

#### We Drill Wells

A new wells can be the difference between life and death. Safe access to clean water creates sustainable communities.

When you give clean water you give time, opportunity, education, and empowerment. When a community receives clean water, they are given the resources of health, hygiene, and time to create a more sustainable society.

Cost: \$8,000



Solving the world water crisis is both the greatest challenge and the greatest opportunity our world has today. With a champion, it is one cause that can be accomplished in the next decade... why not become that champion?



#### Operation Restoration

Can you imagine the frustration of living in a community with a broken water well?

Like a car, wells require regular maintenance, which is why Wells of Life makes it a priority to restore broken wells – *no matter who* drilled them. We use the highest quality materials to restore each well like new.

Cost: \$4,000

#### The Healthy Village Program

The extensive 9-month training in village communities includes indepth training and education on the necessities for sanitation and hygiene.

#### Main Focuses:

- Personal latrines for each household
- Private bathing stations for women and girls
- Handwashing stations next to the latrines
- Dishwashing racks to prevent dishes from drying out on the dirty ground
- Training on how to maintain a clean household environment

Cost: \$12,000





### Built to Last

When 51% of the population of Uganda is without access to safe, clean water it is surely tragic that up to 40% of wells drilled in Uganda wind up non-functional and therefore useless. Unfortunately, too many very-well intentioned drillers practice a "drill and run" strategy, not because they don't care but because their infrastructure is not "Built to Last."

Wells of Life has adopted a longer-term strategy intended to maintain the functionality of our wells for as long as 25 years. Although we assumed this strategy almost from the beginning we didn't really understand at the time just how essential this practice would become.

Over the past decade of drilling and restoring more than 600 wells, we have learned that the viability and functionality of water wells is absolutely essential for the long-term health of a village community.

#### We have developed 3 keys to assure the sustainability of the water wells we drill

- 1. We begin by using more permanent materials such as stainless steel instead of cast iron or PVC for deep wells.
- 2. We have contracted with an Area Service Provider (ASP) to oversee the long-term life of each well using a system of preventative maintenance to replace parts before they break down. However, if a well does break down it is repaired within 48 hours 80% of the time (and no more than 5 days, 100% of the time).
- 3. We assess every well we have drilled annually, with many of our wells being inspected several times each year.



In addition to maintaining our own wells, we began our Operation Restoration Program to repair non-functional wells drilled by other organizations. Our commitment is *safe access to clean water* for everyone. Which would be worse: never having a well or having all the benefits of clean water and then losing them? Often repairing a well may "feel" more valuable than a new well to a community member.

We celebrate our donors for restoring the hope of a community through safe access to clean water.



### Why Uganda?

Ninety percent (90%) of Ugandans live in rural communities with more than half of them lacking safe access to clean water. Water-borne diseases and infant mortality are a daily reality. Lack of access to clean water is the biggest driver of poverty in our world today. By providing a water well, statistics show we decrease infant mortality by up to 50%.

Like Isaiah proclaimed in a vision, "Here I am Lord." Wells of Life feels the same about being there for the wonderful people inhabiting the most rural areas of Uganda. We have heeded the call to serve the most neglected and most needy.

It is an honor to serve such delightful people!

#### What Clean Water Means

Time: It takes an average of 4 hours for a villager to walk to a water source and back, usually 3-4 miles. This has to be done every day. With a well close to home, people would gain back valuable time.

Health: Finding water is difficult, and even when it is found it is most likely contaminated. Access to clean and safe drinking water decreases infant mortality by 50%.

Opportunity: With new found time, families can focus on generating extra income, becoming entrepreneurs, and continuing their education.

**Empowerment:** Communities are empowered with the tools they need to create a sustainable society. Mothers can be present in the home, children can attend school, and families can thrive.



Wells of Life Ireland continued to make steady progress during 2020 and in total funded 4 new wells and 11 restoration wells. Among the highlights of the year were the donation from the Blackstairs Group Water Scheme, which in partnership with the EPS Energy Company resulted in a restoration well. Even more important, we cemented their partnership with Wells of Life that will be sure to endure. Another highlight was the John Hume Memorial well dedicated to the human rights activist and Noble Prize winner, John Hume. The Hume family was deeply moved by the honor of having a well dedicated to him.

A number of people dedicated their birthday gifts to Wells of Life and these combined to fund a restoration well. CELEBRATING THE LIFE OF

### Kobe & Gianna Bryant

In Mayirye, Uganda water well #524 brings a community of 1270 people together. This well is a living memorial of Kobe & Gianna Bryant, and provides clean water as a tribute to the humanitarian lives the Bryant's led. This well also serves a large primary school, church, and medical clinic within the community.

The idea for honoring Kobe and Gianna Bryant with a memorial well was conceived by philanthropists Rand Sperry and Randy Redwitz, who support The Orange Catholic Foundation and Wells of Life. When the well was installed in October 2020, the village was provided with clean water for the first time in its 58-year history. "Water grants a future for our children," said a primary school teacher. The well not only provides water, it provides time and education. Children no longer spend their days walking dangerous stretches of land to fetch filthy water from a pond. This well has provided an opportunity for them to attend school instead, receive an education, and enjoy the wonders of childhood.

Wells of Life created a custom photo book, as we do for all well donations, and provided it to Vanessa Bryant and her family. We were astonished when she recognized our organization on her personal Instagram account, proclaiming her appreciation for the gift of a living tribute to her family. Several publications picked up the story and Wells of Life was recognized across the US including a piece in the Orange County Register and on ABC News!

In January 2021, a celebration of life was held at the well in Mayirye, Uganda to pay tribute to Kobe and Gianna on the oneyear anniversary of their passing. The village members sported Laker's shirts and decorated the well in purple and yellow. Her dream is to become a doctor and work at the Medical Center within the Mayirye Village.

To this day, the Kobe & Gianna Bryant Memorial Well has inspired many families to honor their loved ones with a living tribute of clean water. A memorial that saves lives and ensures that their memory will live on within a village of grateful people for years to come.
